





CSSA & it's Importance to the CSU



The California State Student Association is an organization effort ran by CSU students to advocate on their respective campuses issues, student issues, all while educating students on systemside, state, or federal policymaking.

To foster and coordinate communication among California State University (CSU) campus student associations to develop unity in addressing campus and statewide issues affecting CSU students and the CSU system.”

Every Month, Campuses meet in order to update one another of any work being done of their campuses pertaining to, but not exclusive to Title IX, Finances, or Advocacy efforts.

Every CSU campus has an ASI (Associated Students Incorporated) or an AS (Associated Students) in which is responsible for communicating any issues that affect their campuses or the CSU as a whole.

CSSA is also the reason in which we have two student trustees within CSU's BOD, however they only have one vote between the two.

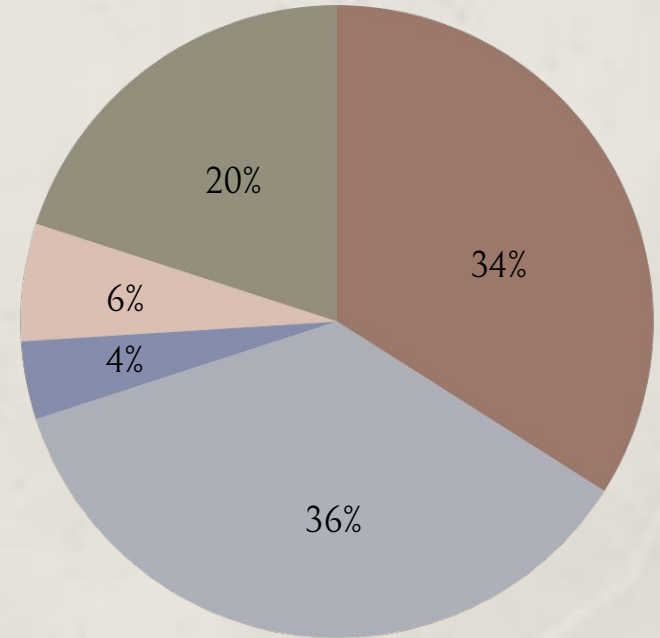

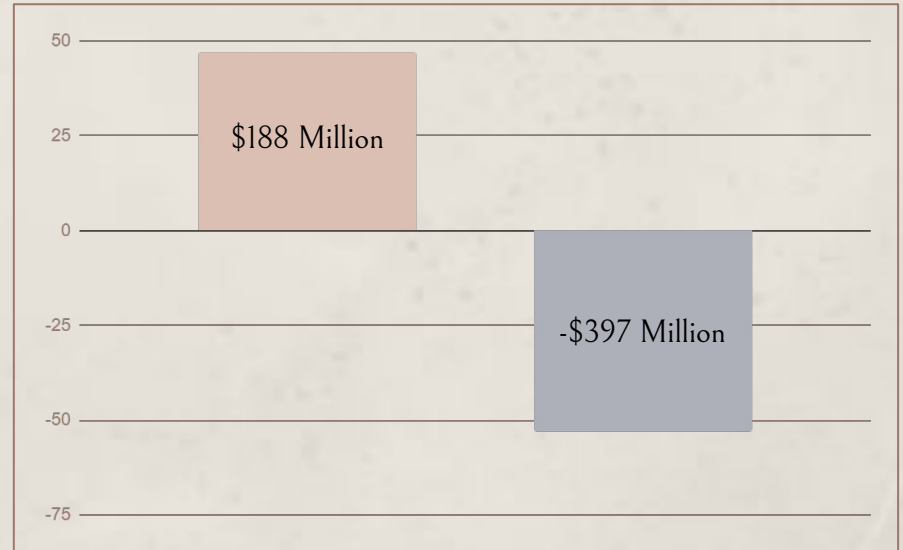

Financial State of the CSU

The governor has proposed an 8% budget cut to the CSU system, equating to nearly \$400 Million.

While the CSU has secured new revenue, it is not enough to sustain the CSU's mission of a accessible & affordable education.

Moving forward, the CSU will have to take cautionary steps if this budget cut is passed to protect it's students from its impact.
